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

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
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Good Ole St. Nick

We celebrate the feast day of St. Nicholas the Wonderworker on December 6. He is well-known as Santa Claus, but he does not have a sleigh with reindeers that fly throughout the world on Christmas Eve delivering gifts to children. In reality, he is a Saint who was the Archbishop of Myra in southern Asia Minor in the fourth century. He inherited his parents' estate and was known for his generous gifts to others.

"There was a certain formerly rich inhabitant of Patara, whom Saint Nicholas saved from great sin. The man had three grown daughters, and in desperation he planned to sell their bodies, so they would have money for food. The saint, learning of the man's poverty and of his wicked intention, secretly visited him one night and threw a sack of gold through the window. With the money the man arranged an honorable marriage for his daughter. Saint Nicholas also provided gold for the other daughters, thereby saving the family from falling into spiritual



destruction. In bestowing charity, Saint Nicholas always strove to do this secretly and to conceal his good deeds" (from https://oca.org/saints/lives/2016/12/06/103484-st-nicholas-the-wonderworker-and-archbishop-of-myra-in-lycia).

St. Nicholas participated in the First Ecumenical Council of Nicea in 325, which was convened to discuss what is today known as the Arian Heresy. In his fervent zeal of the Lord, St. Nicholas is said to have assailed Arius with his words and even struck him in the face. At first he was stripped of his episcopal rank and place under guard, but later the bishops of the Council agreed that Nicholas' response was pleasing to God and restored him to his rank. St. Nicholas died peacefully in his sleep.

St. Nicholas is the patron saint of travelers, victims of floods, poverty or other misfortunes. Many miracles have been attributed to the intercession of this beloved saint. Innumerable churches have been dedicated to him, including our St. Nicholas Church here in Northridge, where I grew up.

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
